EMERGENCY PSYCHOLOGY

What is it about?

The level of stress experienced by victims when emergency situations occur is very high and the negative mental health consequences can be serious if not intervened. Appropriate psychological strategies should be used for each case.

Emergency psychology is oriented to immediate and rapid intervention on site and its function is to facilitate adequate coping in situations with high emotional content, helping people to go through the traumatic event, trying to make the subsequent impact as minimal as possible.

This type of psychological assistance offers a low-intensity and immediate response directly in the affected areas, and identifies severe cases and, therefore, contributes to a better distribution of existing psychological resources.

Emergency psychology assistance is a well-structured professional intervention only used by licensed psychologists, because it is much more than a form of psychological first aid that can be offered by any volunteer without an official training in psychology.

In addition to observing, listening, and connecting people with resources (what psychological first aid offers), during an emergency requiring psychology assistance licensed professionals analyze emotions, cognitive, behavioral, and psychosomatic reactions. They are helping affected people to reorganize and integrate the correctly processed information related to the traumatic events.

Objectives of Emergency Psychology assistance on site during disasters:

- Minimize the impact of the traumatic event: normalizing symptoms
- Facilitate coping strategies
- Reduce the probability of future psychopathological disorder
- Inform about the situation and possible actions and resources
- Connect people with resources and their support groups
- Referral pathways: connect affected people with mental health care services
