1 Croatia – Facts and Figures

1.1 About the Country

Croatia is a country with a thousand-year-old history. Encompassing an area of 56.542 square kilometres, it is characterized by its stunning coastline stretching 5,835 kilometres, inclusive of its picturesque islands. Of the 1.185 islands, only 47 are inhabited. Croatia's total population was 4.02 million in January 2023. The capital is Zagreb, a city teeming with Central European charm.



Croatia lies at the intersection of the Mediterranean, the Alps and the Pannonian plains. These various features have merged into a unique and charming harmony of opposites. Although Croatia's main attraction is the coast and its islands, the beauty of its inland might surprise you.

Gorski kotar is a mountain region where nature lovers, mountaineers, hikers, winter-sports enthusiasts, and hunters can enjoy the unspoiled

beauty of nature. Lika, the region nestled behind the Velebit mountain range, provides a serene retreat for visitors. Moving inland, Hrvatsko zagorje features charming Baroque castles and thermal spas, while the region of Podravina and the fertile plains of Slavonija captivate with their picturesque scenery and rich cultural heritage.

Alongside its diverse natural beauty, Croatia is also renowned for its pristine environment. Today, around 8% of Croatia's territory is designated as nature reserves, mainly national parks. It is a remarkably valuable and environmentally preserved asset nestled in the heart of Europe. Of the eight national parks, half are located in mountainous regions (Risnjak, Paklenica, Plitvice Lakes and Sjeverni Velebit), while the other four are on the coast (Kornati, Mljet, Brijuni and Krka). Of the latter four, all except Krka are located on islands.



Croatia is home to numerous monuments that are part of the world's cultural and historical heritage. Particularly noteworthy are the "monument cities" of Dubrovnik (part of the World Heritage Site and under UNESCO protection), Split, Pula, Poreč, Trogir, Hvar and Šibenik.

The Austrian and Hungarian royal families, and many other European kings and emperors, heirs and dukes came here in winter to enjoy the mild

climate and beautiful scenery. Croatia has attracted many famous personalities throughout history, such as the famous dancer Isadora Duncan, who was enchanted by the beauties of Opatija, Lord Byron who fell in love with a beautiful blonde from the north, and Agatha Christie, who spent her second honeymoon in Dubrovnik and Split.

Some world-famous writers have commented on the beauty of the country in their works. Writers such as George Bernard Shaw, Carlo Goldoni, Jack London and Eugene Ionesco have all written about Croatia. Few know that Shakespeare's *Twelfth Night* is set here, Jules Verne's *Voyage au centre de la Terre* began in Pazin (Istria) and James Joyce lived in Pula for a time.

Croatia was named the top destination for 2005 by Lonely Planet Staffers, one of the world's leading travel platforms. Furthermore, it was included among the top 10 countries to visit in 2024. In 2006, National Geographic Adventure declared Croatia the number one "Hot Adventure Destination.

2 University Locations

2.1 Rijeka – the City, www.rijeka.hr

With its 130,000 inhabitants, Rijeka is the third largest city and the largest Croatian port. Rijeka is located on the Kvarner Bay, in the northernmost part of the Adriatic Sea, where the Mediterranean Sea penetrates deepest into the European mainland and comes closest to the countries of Central Europe. The city is not far from the Italian and Slovenian borders and is surrounded by mountains and numerous picturesque coastal towns.

Rijeka enjoys a pleasant Mediterranean climate characterized by warm summers and relatively mild winters. Temperatures range from 6°C in January to 37°C in July. The average temperature in July is 23°C, while the coldest month, January, averages 5.2°C. Winter lows typically remain above -3°C, and during the summer, air temperatures can influence sea temperatures, which can reach up to 25°C. The annual average sea temperature stands at 16°C.

The mountains around Kvarner, from Učka over the hills of Gorski kotar to Velebit, form an impressive natural backdrop that is particularly beautiful when approaching Rijeka from the sea. Occasionally, throughout the year and especially in winter, the cold bora (bura) wind blows down the mountains, causing a sudden drop in temperature and purifying the air over Rijeka.

In addition to the bora, which brings cold and clear weather, the sirocco (jugo) brings cloudy and rainy weather. In summer, the north-westerly wind mistral is frequent. It brings a breath of cool air on hot summer days and is ideal for sailing.

The Rječina, a karst river, plays an important role in the life of the city of Rijeka, as it supplies the city and its surroundings with drinking water.

The close proximity of the Gorski kotar highlands and the tourist centres on the coast offer Rijeka residents and visitors a unique opportunity to take part in various sports and recreational activities.

The first known inhabitants of the area were the Illyrians and the Celts. During the Roman Empire, a municipality known as Tarsatica was located here. In the 7th century, the Croats settled in Tarsatica and the surrounding area. In later eras, until the end of Second World War, Rijeka was ruled alternately by the Habsburgs, the Hungarian royal family, the Croatian nobility and Italy. Rijeka became part of Croatia in 1945.

In addition to its role as an economic and transport hub, Rijeka continues to be an important cultural and educational centre. Rijeka hosts numerous cultural events, such as theatre performances, concerts, exhibitions, the traditional international Carnival Parade, fairs and sporting events. Rijeka is renowned for its cultural landmarks that offer glimpses into past centuries. These include the remnants of ancient Tarsatica, the Roman Arch known as the Gate (the oldest historical monument in Rijeka), the City Tower, the Church of St. Sebastian, the Church of the Assumption, the Palace of the Old Town Hall, and St. Vitus' Church. Additionally, notable sites include the Maritime and Historical Museum of the Croatian Coast (formerly the Governor's Palace), the Croatian National Theatre, the University Library featuring the Modern Art Gallery, Trsat Castle, and various buildings predominantly dating back to the 19th century.

Curiosities:

- The world's first torpedo was made in Rijeka.
- Fiorello la Guardia, New York's most famous mayor, worked at the American consulate in Rijeka.
- Rijeka is the city with the highest number of Baroque marble altars on the eastern part of the Adriatic coast.
- The first steam engine in Southeast Europe was manufactured in Rijeka.
- The first museum in Croatia was founded in Trsat in 1843.
- The first photo of a supersonic flying bullet was taken in Rijeka.
- You can find one of the few surviving life jackets from the Titanic in Rijeka.

2.2 Opatija, <u>www.opatija.hr</u>



The name Opatija is derived from the Benedictine abbey (opatija in Croatian), which was built on the coast between 1400 and 1440. The oldest known records of Opatija date back to the mid-15th century and include documents from fra Giacomo (1449) and a bull of Pope Nicholas V (1453). Initially settled by fishermen and farmers, Opatija's population grew to about 250 by the mid-19th century.

A historical turning point in the development of the town was the year 1844, when a prominent citizen of Rijeka, Iginio Scarpa, built a summer residence next to the 16th century Church of St. Jacob, which he named Villa Angiolina after his wife. Thanks to the Scarpa family's hospitality, Villa Angiolina became the centre of social life in Istria and Opatija became a popular tourist destination. The year 1844 is considered the beginning of tourism in Opatija. The visits of Ban Josip Jelačić in 1854 and Empress Maria Ana, the wife of Emperor Ferdinand I, in 1860 contributed to Opatija becoming increasingly well-known outside Istria.

News of the pretty little town on the Adriatic coast spread throughout Europe, and on March 4, 1889, Opatija was officially named a health resort, which greatly boosted its development.

Opatija, popularly known as the pearl of the Austrian Riviera, became an important tourist destination for Austrian and European celebrities. In 1920, Opatija was awarded to the Kingdom of Italy by the Treaty of Rapallo, which slowed down the town's development.

After the Second World War, tourism was revived and today Opatija is one of Croatia's most famous and renowned tourist centres and a popular venue for conferences and meetings. With the opening of the Thalassotherapia, Ambasador, Adriatic and Admiral hotels and the Ičići marina, Opatija gained particular importance as a health resort and tourist destination.

2.3 Croatia info card – What to expect?

Language. The official language is Croatian, written in the Latin alphabet. In the coastal regions of the country Italian can be useful, as the local population speaks a related dialect. If these languages are not your forte, don't worry – most younger people and officials speak English, so you should have no trouble getting around if you know English.

Religion. According to the last census (2021), 79% of Croatia's population identifies as Catholic. Other religions are represented to a lesser extent, with 3.3% identifying as Serbian Orthodox and 1.3% as Muslims. Nearly 5% of the population identifies as nonreligious or atheists. In Croatia, major holidays are based on Catholic liturgical year. However, members of other denominations are free to celebrate their holidays and practice their religious customs.

Politics and economy. Croatia is a democratic republic with the president as the highest political authority and an elected parliament. The country is divided into 21 self-governing counties. The capital is Zagreb, which is also the largest city, followed by Split and Rijeka in terms of size. The official currency is the euro. The most developed economic sector is the tertiary sector, especially tourism and hospitality.

Population. The Croatian population is around 4 million people. Ethnically, the population consists mostly of Croats (>90%), while most national minorities include citizens from neighboring countries.

Climate. Croatia has different climate zones: Mediterranean, continental and mountainous, but the climate can generally be described by dry and hot summers and humid and mild winters. With an average of 2,600 hours of sunshine per year, the Adriatic coast is one of the sunniest regions in the Mediterranean, with an average summer sea temperature of 25°C to 27°C. Another note: rain is not an uncommon sight in Rijeka.

Customs. Croatia, like many Mediterranean countries, maintains a smaller interpersonal distance, so it's common for people to stand close when talking, waiting in line, or in crowded places. Warm relationships and friendly communication styles, even with strangers, are typical. Croatians take pride in their rich cultural heritage and sports achievements. Food and drinks play an important role in the culture. Croatia is generally considered safe, with the only notable risk being pickpocketing in crowded tourist areas during the summer.

3 Useful Information

3.1 General

3.1.1 Post and Telecom Services

The phone code for Croatia is +385, succeeded by the two-digit code of the town.

Post offices are typically open from 7 h until 20 h and on Saturdays until 13 h. Stamps can be purchased at post offices and newsstands.

If your cell phone does not have a roaming option, we strongly recommend that you arrange this with your local mobile provider before your departure. When you arrive in Croatia, one of the three networks will automatically be shown on your display (A1, T-Mobile or Telemach). For price information, please contact your mobile phone provider before your departure.

For local calls from a cell phone to a landline, you must dial 051 (area code for Rijeka) and then enter the phone number.

3.1.2 Chemists/Pharmacies

Pharmacies are open during normal business hours from 8 h to 20 h. The pharmacy "Centar" is open 24 hours a day and is located in the city centre at Riva 18, near the beginning of Korzo Street.

3.1.3 Banks

Banks are open on weekdays from 8 h to 19 h, and on Saturdays till 12 h.

3.1.4 Shops

Common working hours are weekdays from 8 h to 20 h, and on Saturdays until noon. Working on Sundays is generally prohibited, but merchants may choose to open retail stores up to 16 Sundays per calendar year. Therefore, it is advisable to check their websites for specific opening hours. Local food shops operate from Monday to Saturday, typically from 6 h to 19:30 h. Supermarkets, which usually offer lower prices, are open from 7 h until 21 or 22 h, depending on the season. ZTC /http://www.ztc-shopping.hr/ and Tower Centre Rijeka / http://www.tower-center-rijeka.hr/ are large shopping malls, offering a wide range of stores, food courts and entertainment facilities.

3.1.5 Currency – Exchange Rates

The currency in the Republic of Croatia is the euro (€).

Foreign currency can be exchanged at banks, exchange offices, post offices and most tourist offices, hotels, campsites and marinas.

All major credit cards – Visa, Diners Club and Mastercard are accepted almost everywhere. ATMs are easily found in the region.

3.3 Sports and Recreational Centres

Sports fans can visit the football stadium and swimming pool complex in the western part of the city called Kantrida, as well as the "Mladost" sports hall in Trsat (where basketball, handball and volleyball are played).

The Zamet sports centre is located in the Zamet district of Rijeka. It has various facilities: a sports hall, a local committee office, shops, a public square and a car park.

Near Rijeka, on the Grobničko polje (Grobnik field), the famous Alpe Adria race takes place every year, which is known worldwide.

3.4 Local Transport

Public transport in Rijeka is organised by the city bus company Autotrolej. The company also offers journeys to many tourist destinations in Kvarner (to Opatija and Lovran in the north and to Crikvenica and Selce in the south), making these towns easily accessible. However, the city bus company does not offer connections to the island of Krk, so you will have to take the regular intercity bus line, which is more expensive, and these buses can be very crowded on weekends and in summer.

There are several types of bus tickets:

- Monthly bus pass: price 21,37 € for students and 44,06 € for non-students (city line prices)
- Round-trip ticket: price 2,80 € (city line prices). These tickets may be obtained at newsstands.
- One-way ticket (only available on the bus): price 2,00 € (city line prices).
- Day ticket: price 3,19 €
- Weekly ticket: price 12,74 €

How do I get a monthly bus pass?

- Bring a photo (3 x 3.5 cm), a certificate of attendance from the administrative office of your faculty and a completed and verified application for a bus pass, which you can obtain at the Autotrolej office on Jelačić Square.
- If you have only come to Rijeka as a visitor, you are also entitled to a bus pass. It is slightly more expensive than the student pass, but the procedure is easier. Just go to the office mentioned above and bring a document, a photo and the money and you can buy your pass.

4 Travelling to the University of Rijeka and Settling In

4.1 Visa Application Requirements

Foreign citizens require a visa to enter the Republic of Croatia in accordance with the visa system prescribed by the Croatian government.

You do not need a visa for travelling within the EU if you are a citizen of an EU country, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway or Switzerland.

Visas are normally issued by the diplomatic mission or consulate of the Republic of Croatia. A visa cannot be used as a work permit.

4.1.1 Procedure

Foreign citizens who are subject to visa requirement are obligated to apply for a visa prior to their entry into the Republic of Croatia, at the authorized Croatian diplomatic mission/consular post.

If there is no Croatian diplomatic mission or consular post in the applicant's country, an application for a visa may be submitted to the nearest Croatian diplomatic mission/consular post.

As a general rule, a foreign citizen shall submit a visa application personally. Foreign citizens need not submit the application personally, but they are required to present themselves when called upon by the diplomatic mission/consular post.

A visa application for a foreign citizen who is a minor or a foreign citizen deprived of his/her business capacity shall be submitted by his/her legal representative.

Visa application shall be submitted no sooner than three months prior to the date of the intended trip.

Foreign citizens shall enclose the following documents with the application:

- Valid travel document (the period of validity of the travel document should exceed that of the visa's by three months, must be issued in the last 10 years, must have at least 2 empty pages left),
- Colour photo 35x45 mm,
- Evidence of paid visa fee,
- Supporting documents that prove,
- The purpose of the journey to the Republic of Croatia,
- Ensured accommodation,
- Means of subsistence to cover their stay in the Republic of Croatia and the return to their country
 of origin or to a third country have been provided,
- Means of transport and their intention to return to their country of origin or to a third country,
- Travel health insurance.

4.1.2 Visa information

All information related to visa requirements, fees, the list of countries whose citizens require visa for Croatia as well as the Visa application form can be found at the web page of the Ministry of Foreign and European Affairs: https://mvep.gov.hr/embassies-and-consulates/embassies-of-the-republic-of-croatia-in-the-world/244601.

Note: The information on this website is subject to change. You should therefore check with your nearest Croatian diplomatic mission/consular post before travelling.

4.2 Requirements for Temporary Stay

4.2.1 Address Registration

Hotels and student dormitories register their foreign guests with the Primorsko-Goranska County Police Department. Foreign nationals (with the exception of nationals of the EU, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland) staying in a flat should register their address or change of address in person at the nearest police station of the Primorsko-Goranska County Police Administration within twenty-four hours of their arrival (excluding weekends).

There is a simple form to fill in (Form 8A: Registration and cancellation of residence or registration of a change of address) and the foreign citizen receives a receipt. If he/she changes his/her address or leaves the country during the 90-day period and returns, he/she must repeat the procedure.

Documents needed for the address registration:

- Passport (original and a copy),
- Form issued at the Primorsko-Goranska County Police Administration,
- A valid Croatian Identity Card of the landlord/landlady who legally owns the apartment (if a foreign citizen has already rented an apartment),
- Four copies of the Tenancy contract and four copies of the Proprietor's certificate for the rented apartment (notarized by a notary public).

4.2.2 Short-term stay – stay of up to 90 days, with or without visa

Foreign citizens who are not obligated to possess a visa to enter the Republic of Croatia may stay in the Republic of Croatia for a maximum of 90 days within a period of 6 months, starting from the day of their first entry.

4.2.3 Temporary Stay Permit on EU/EEA citizens

The students (holders of a scholarship within the following programmes: Erasmus+, Erasmus Mundus, CEEPUS, bilateral exchange) apply for the FIRST TEMPORARY STAY PERMIT in person at a local police administration or a police station in Croatia (check the Article 4.2.1 for the addresses).

EU citizens and citizens of Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland must apply for a residence permit in person at the Primorsko-Goranska County Police Administration no later than 8 days after the end of their three-month stay in the Republic of Croatia.

The following documents should be enclosed with the application for the first temporary stay permit:

- The application for the issuance of his/her first temporary stay permit (Form 1a *1),
- 2 colour photographs, 35 x 45 mm,

- Valid travel document (original and copy),
- Official confirmation of residence (lease contract or statement of apartment/house owner authorized and verified residence by a notary public and proof of ownership of apartment or sales contract or contract of gift),
- Official confirmation of insurance (original and copy of the health insurance policy),
- Official confirmation of subsistence means (certificate of employment with amount of income or other proof of secured means for subsistence in the Republic of Croatia. Proof of secured means of support attached to the request must be in the name of the foreigner, immediate family member or joint household family member in the approximate amount of 300.00 EUR – original and copy not older than 6 months),
- Proof of the reasons for temporary stay (Erasmus students shall receive a written confirmation by the University of Rijeka – Acceptance letter, proving their status of Erasmus exchange students),
- A copy of OIB personal identification number (original and copy) you will make the OIB upon arrival

4.2.4 Temporary Stay Permit of non-EU citizens

Third-country nationals can stay in the Republic of Croatia for a short stay of up to 90 days within a period of 180 days, whereby the 90-day stay can be used once or several times.

The application for a temporary stay is submitted to the diplomatic representation, i.e. the consulate of the Republic of Croatia, before entering the Republic of Croatia (for citizens who require a visa).

Conditions for the granting of a temporary residence permit:

- Prove the purpose of the temporary stay,
- Has a valid travel document; the period of validity of a foreign travel document must be three
 months longer than the period of validity of the temporary residence permit
- Has means of subsistence,
- Has health insurance,
- When arranging the first temporary stay, proof that they have not been convicted of a criminal
 offence in their home country or in the country in which they stayed for more than one year
 immediately before arriving in the Republic of Croatia (this proof does not have to be provided
 by a third-country national if they are a student or researcher from another EEA Member State)
- There is no entry and residence ban in the Republic of Croatia or a warning in the Schengen Information System for the purpose of entry ban,
- Does not pose a threat to public order, national security or public health.

The documents attached to the application must be originals or notarised copies. Documents written in a foreign language must be submitted together with the certified Croatian translation and notarised in accordance with the special provisions. The date of the documents should not be more than 6 months prior to their submission.

If the application is approved, the foreign citizen in question will receive a temporary residence permit in the form of a sticker in their travel document. The applicant should enquire at the police station where he/she applied for the temporary residence permit as to when the permit will be issued.

The authorisation for the first temporary stay, i.e. the extension of the temporary residence permit, is valid for a period of up to 1 year. The application for the extension of the temporary residence permit must be submitted to a police administration or police station no later than 30 days before the expiry of the existing temporary residence permit. If the foreign national concerned does not apply for the extension of the temporary residence permit, heor she will be fined.

4.4 Health Insurance

All foreign students must have health insurance during their stay in Croatia. It is best to take out insurance in your home country that also covers your stay in Croatia. They can use the international health insurance of your home country or take out insurance with a health insurance company of your choice.

EU citizens and citizens of Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland can apply for the European Health Insurance Card (or EHIC) from their country's healthcare organisation before travelling to Croatia.

The European Health Insurance Card is issued free of charge and enables anyone who is insured under an EU statutory social security scheme to receive medical treatment in another Member State free of charge or at a reduced rate if such treatment becomes necessary during their stay. It covers the costs of the treatment required to enable you to continue your stay until your planned return. The EHIC is not an alternative to travel insurance. It does not cover private medical treatment. It is therefore advisable to have both an EHIC and valid private travel insurance.

4.5 How to Arrive to Rijeka

4.5.1 By Train

You can reach Rijeka from Zagreb, the capital of Croatia, in less than 3 hours. The fastest means of transport is the Inter-City train from Zagreb to Rijeka, which runs twice a day. There are also daily direct trains to Rijeka from Ljubljana, Budapest, Munich and Vienna. It is very difficult to reach Rijeka by train from the southern parts of Croatia.

4.5.2 By Air

Rijeka Airport is located on the island of Krk, which is connected to the mainland by the Krk Bridge. The airport is about 27 km from Rijeka city centre. You can reach Rijeka city centre in about 45 minutes by bus operated by Croatia Airlines. Please check the website www.rijeka-airport.hr for available flights.

However, there are several airports that are relatively easy to reach from Rijeka. Zagreb Airport (175 km from Rijeka) offers flights to all major European cities (Paris, London, Amsterdam, Zurich, Frankfurt, Brussels, Düsseldorf, Berlin, Prague, Vienna, Munich, Sarajevo, Skopje and Mostar) as well as to many other cities (via Frankfurt). It is also possible to take a direct bus to/from Zagreb airport to/from Rijeka every afternoon. The bus journey to Rijeka takes 2 hours and the buses are generally comfortable.

Other airports close to Rijeka are: Brnik (Ljubljana, Slovenia) (138 km from Rijeka), Ronchi dei Legionari (Trieste, Italy) (112 km from Rijeka), Pula (97 km from Rijeka) and Marco Polo (Venice, Italy) (223 km from Rijeka).

The Rijeka Student Centre comprises two student dormitories: student dormitory Ivan Goran Kovačić residence and the new student dormitory Trsat on Kampus, which opened in July 2016. Life in student dormitories is organised according to the needs and requirements of the students. It includes an appropriate standard of living and dining. Students can satisfy their cultural and sporting needs and live in a safe environment.

Student dormitory Ivan Goran Kovačić Student Residence provides accommodation for full-time students, students on international exchange and mobility programmes, students on internships and full-time students who are victims of a major tragic accident. of larger scale. The dormitory consists of five buildings. The total capacity of student dormitory Ivan Goran Kovačić is 642 beds for students and 16 beds for visiting professors. In the dormitory there is a laundry room with equipment for glazing, a classroom, a computer room, a restaurant Mini, a kitchenette and a bathroom on each floor, a small gym, two sports fields and a terrace. All rooms have free internet access.



Student dormitory "Trsat" offers 36 beds for Erasmus students. The new student dormitory has:a laundry room with equipment for glazing, a classroom, a large computer room, a fitness room, a restaurant, a pizzeria, a coffee bar and so on. All rooms have free internet access. The rooms are equipped with all necessary appliances and offer a high quality student life to the users of the accommodation. These rooms are available in the period from 1 September to 15 July.

The number of beds reserved for Erasmus students is limited. Rooms are allocated to students on a "first-come, first-served " basis.

During the summer (from 1 July to 27 September), Erasmus students can be accommodated in a double room in Pavilion 1 in Student dormitoy "Ivan Goran Kovačić".

HI Hostel Rijeka, a beautiful 19th century villa, is located in a lovely residential neighbourhood (called Pećine) overlooking the Adriatic Sea. It is only a 15-minute walk from the city centre, but the local bus stops right in front of the hostel. Capacity is limited (61 beds) and booking in advance is strongly recommended. Erasmus students receive a 20% discount on the hostel rates.

Facilities include a reception (0-24), restaurant, TV room, seminar room, internet access, tourist information and vending machines with hot and cold drinks.

Dharma Hostel promotes holistic tourism and focuses on the holistic system that integrates body, mind and spirit to create a balanced, self-renewing and sustainable tourism and the relationship between people, buildings and the environment in connection with the natural cycles of the region.

Dharma Hostel services include sleeping facilities, various forms of active holidays (yoga, anti-stress techniques, meditation, excursions, etc.) and healthy vegetarian cuisine.

4.6.3 Private Housing

The members of the Erasmus Student Network (www.facebook.com/ErasmusRijeka/) and your Erasmus buddies will also be able to help you find suitable accommodation.

The estimated prices for accommodation are as follows:

- Room (with a landlord): €250–€350 per month
- Flat: €400–€600 per month

Prices vary depending on the size of the flat, central heating, location, overall comfort, etc. Service charges are sometimes included in the price and sometimes paid by the consumer. Payment is expected at the beginning of the month, while some landlords require payment for several months in advance.

The easiest way to rent a room or a flat is to place an advert in a newspaper or in the classifieds, for example in Butiga, Burza (free) and Novi List (paid).

The best time for apartment hunting is August and the beginning of September, as well as in between semesters (February). The end of September and October are the worst periods for apartment searching because many students are searching at that time, thus prices are higher and it is more difficult to find good value for money.

4.6.4 Living expenses

Taking everything into account, the monthly cost of living should be around €830 (€500 for accommodation plus utilities, €300 for food, €30 for public transport). However, much depends on your own lifestyle and the accommodation you choose. The following prices are only a rough estimate for orientation purposes:

4.6.5 Student identity card (X-card)

Erasmus students studying at the University of Rijeka are entitled to a student card (X-Card) during their stay in Rijeka. With it, they can eat in student cafés and restaurants at a reduced price. It serves as proof of student status and can also be used for a discount on some tickets and services.

The faculties provide students with identity cards (X-cards). Upon arrival in Rijeka, Erasmus students should contact their faculties in this regard. In order to obtain the X-card, students must apply for a personal identification number (OIB in Croatian) at the Tax Department (Riva 2, Rijeka). They must fill in the form they receive there and bring the original and a copy of their passport. The Tax Department will issue the OIB number on the same day.

The modern university was founded on 17 May 1973, but the first university was founded by the Jesuits in 1627 and enjoyed the same status as the academies in the largest cities of the Austrian Empire. The Faculty of Philosophy, founded in 1726, was in operation for two years. The Faculty of Theology was founded in 1728. From 1773 to 1780 Rijeka was the headquarter of the Royal Academy.

The University of Rijeka has matured into a modern European university and a centre of excellence whose impact extends beyond the region. The University of Rijeka is a research-, science- and education-orientated university that supports the social and economic development of our municipality, the city of Rijeka and the entire region.

5.2 International Mobility / Erasmus Centre

The cooperation of the University of Rijeka with foreign universities, scientific and research institutions, international agencies and associations is an important area of development. It is also considered one of its fundamental goals

The University's openness towards society and the world is a prerequisite for its further development. Openness and contacts with foreign institutions are seen as an instrument for measuring progress and accepting the world's leading criteria in research and education.

The main focus is on participation in bilateral and multilateral research programmes, mobility programmes for students, exchange programmes for young researchers and university teachers and securing scholarships and grants for professional development.

The University endeavours to promote all existing forms of international cooperation and to create conditions for new models of international cooperation. The University of Rijeka promotes and facilitates student mobility through the Erasmus programme.

The International Mobility Centre is responsible for the Erasmus programme at the University of Rijeka, specifically for Key Action 1, the individual mobility of students and staff. UNIRI joined the Erasmus programme in 2009 and has since signed over 800 bilateral Erasmus agreements with universities from most EU countries. This co-operation includes student and staff exchanges. Since 2009, more than 2600 students from the University of Rijeka and 1100 staff members have participated in Erasmus. Since 2011, the University of Rijeka has welcomed more than 3000 new students and 1100 new staff members. Mobility numbers are increasing rapidly. Today, the International Mobility Centre of the University of Rijeka manages more than 800 incoming/outgoing students and 500 incoming/outgoing staff per academic year.

What is ESN?

The Erasmus Student Network (ESN) is the largest interdisciplinary student organisation in Europe, which has been supporting and promoting international student exchanges since 1989. It consists of around 15,000 members from over 550 local chapters in 43 countries at higher education institutions, including universities, universities of applied sciences and university colleges. The network offers its services to around 200,000 international students each year.

ESN Rijeka is a voluntary student organisation that is part of the Erasmus Student Network and, with the support and in cooperation with the International Relations Office of the University of Rijeka, takes care of exchange students arriving in Rijeka and local students leaving for their exchange stay. The members of the organisation, who work under the motto "Students helping students", have the common goal of creating a connection between Erasmus students and between Erasmus students and the local community, so that their stay is educational and filled with unforgettable and fun experiences and friendships.

5.4 The Rijeka School of Croatian Studies

The Rijeka School of Croatian Studies is part of the Department of Croatian Studies at the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences of the University of Rijeka.

It offers courses in Croatian as a second or foreign language. The courses offered vary in duration (number of lessons), content, objectives and intensity. Each course combines language lessons with lessons on Croatian culture and civilisation.

The Rijeka School of Croatian Studies promotes the Croatian language, literature and culture on an international level, develops modern methods for teaching Croatian as a second or foreign language, promotes mobility and organises tests for Croatian as a second or foreign language. Other goals include the development and production of standardised test and teaching materials, the organisation of academic and professional conferences and the implementation of specialist, translation and teaching projects to promote the Croatian language, literature and culture abroad. The school co-operates with

other domestic and foreign institutions that share its goals, with Croatian language teachers at foreign universities and academic institutions and with scholars in Croatia and abroad and establishes links with Croatian emigrants.

Prospective Erasmus students are recommended to choose the following courses: Croatian as a Foreign Language 1 (beginner level), Croatian as a Foreign Language 2 (intermediate level) and Croatian as a Foreign Language 3 (advanced level). Each course consists of 60 lessons, two hours/twice a week, and corresponds to 4 ECTS credits.

The courses are part of the Learning Agreement, and the student should inform the host Erasmus coordinator at the UNIRI faculty about the course participation.

5.7 Teaching System

For most studies, students can expect a more or less equal mix of theoretical lectures and practical work, often in the form of seminars held for a restricted number of students.

Final assessment for most programmes takes place at the end of the semester/year by written and oral examinations for each of the courses attended. Usually, the final assessment is based on performance recorded during the semester.

5.9 Diversity, Inclusion and Student Support

University of Rijeka includes a number of student services related to different aspects of support and counselling. Official services (free of charge) are provided within the University Counselling Centre and include Psychological Counselling Centre, Office for Students with Disabilities and Career Office.

University of Rijeka is committed to assisting all students who have permanent, occasional or temporary difficulties in the implementation of daily academic activities due to illness or impairment. Students who require additional support or assistance regarding their disability or special educational need (e.g. visual, hearing, physical impairments, learning disabilities or illnesses) should contact the Office for students with disabilities as soon as they are enrolled to University of Rijeka and before classes start. Office activities are tailored to individual student needs (e.g. exam exemptions, peer support or specialized transportation).

Like any other part of life, studying may also bring various challenges which can sometimes be easy to deal with, but sometimes also interfere with student's everyday lives. For this reason, the University's Psychological Counselling Office offers students professional psychological help needed to improve the quality of studying and life or achieve their academic goals. Common activities include individual and group counselling, online learning assistance or psychoeducational resources (leaflets, brochures, workshops, lectures...).

University's Career Office provides students with professional assistance related to managing their careers, supports them in developing entrepreneurial skills, educates students how to increase their prospects on the labour market and connects them with potential employers. This is achieved through various activities like counselling, informing, educations or research.

6.1 Academy of Applied Arts

The Academy of Applied Arts in Rijeka has its roots in the Department of Fine Arts, founded in 1963 at the Teacher's Training College in Rijeka as a two-year study. With the establishment of the Faculty of Education in 1977, the Department of Fine Arts started the programme of four-year study in the academic year of 1979/1980 and enrolled the first generation of students who would graduate as professors. In 1998, the Faculty of Education was renamed into the Faculty of Philosophy, so that the Department of Art Education and Fine Arts became an integral part of this higher education institution. During that period, the quality of the study gradually increased and the result of such education became evident in the emergence of many prominent art educators, artists and art historians both in the city of Rijeka and in the surrounding region. The Department of Art Education experienced further development in 2003, when the Department officially emancipated from Department of History of Art, which represents the beginning of the constitution of the Academy of Applied Arts.



In 2004, the Academy received a work licence issued by the Ministry of Science, Education and Sports, and in November 2005, the Academy was constituted as a new artistic educational institution of the University of Rijeka, as the only higher education institution in Croatia that fosters applied arts. Soon the Academy became attractive for the students from all the parts of Croatia.

The Academy is founded as an institution that fosters continuous propulsive varieties of styles, materials, ideas, and a strong and distinctive tradition of artists and educators and their works. The aim is to improve the aesthetic and intellectual environment which encourages and teaches the highest level of creativity and critical thinking, encouraged by implementation of two main undergraduate and graduate study programmes, Art Education and Applied Arts, which occurred in academic year 2005/2006, and the study programme Media Arts and Practices, started as the pilot study programme in 2013/2014. From the

academic year 2015/2016 the undergraduate study of Acting and Media became part of the study programmes of the Academy as well as the graduate study of Acting.

Graduate study programme of Visual Communication and Graphic Design started in the academic year 2017/2018 and the undergraduate study of Graphic Design and Visual Communications in 2020/2021.

Academy has also established four Centres of the Academy, in order to increase visibility of the Academy in public and provide its graduate students and Alumni with the opportunity for further professional development.

Centre for Innovative Media is active from the year 2017, Quark – Centre for ceramics from 2018, Centre for Design and Production from 2017 and Centre for Glass and Mosaic from 2021. So far Academy has partnered up with 34 universities within the scope of Erasmus+ and CEEPUS programmes.

Today Academy of Applied Arts is a propulsive art institution with the strategy of contemporary approach within the wide field of fine arts, applied arts, art education and acting and media, and with affirmative impact on community and job market.

6.2 Faculty of Economics and Business

The Faculty of Economics and Business was founded in mid-1961 as a part of the University of Zagreb. Once the University of Rijeka was founded in 1973, the Faculty became its member. In 2020/2021, the Faculty of Economics and Business in Rijeka celebrated its 60th anniversary, sixty years of continuous teaching in the field of economics and business.

Since 2005/2006, the Faculty of Economics and Business has been running university study programmes in line with the Bologna Declaration, within two lines of studies: Economics and Business Economics. While developing new study programmes, the Faculty opted for the 3+2+3 model, i.e. after three years of studying at the undergraduate level, students obtain an university bachelor' degree. After two years of additional studies at the graduate level, they obtain a master's degree. After attending three years of postgraduate doctoral studies, students obtain a doctoral degree. The Faculty is also running several 1-year and 1,5-year postgraduate specialist programs in varies areas.

In addition to higher education, the Faculty carries out scientific and professional work. As a part of this activity, international cooperation of the Faculty stands out as a particularly important segment that is growing and developing through various forms of cooperation with many international universities and institutions. Other important segment of the Faculty is the scientific research work, which concerns a publishing activity through its own Proceedings - The Journal of Economics and Business, which has been abstracted and indexed in SCOPUS, SSCI, ESCI, JCR, EBSCO, EconLit, SocINDEX and ERIH PLUS databases. It is also important to mention the individual scientific work of Faculty's teaching staff, which regularly publishes their papers in national and international scientific and professional journals.

The Faculty of Economics and Business is an institution that successfully develops scientific projects funded by Croatian Science Foundation as well as EU founded projects. The Faculty also carries out professional and feasibility studies, seminars, conferences and other scientific and research activities for purposes of the local and national economy and the local government.

Furthermore, the Faculty is a full member of the prestigious EFMD - European Foundation for Management Development in Brussels (also EPAS-accredited) and the full member of the AACSB - Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business, enjoying also partnerships within the PILA - Publishers International Linking Association, the CESEENET - Central and South-East European PhD Network, the CEDIMES - Centre for Studies in International Development and Economic and Social Movements in Paris, the CEEPUS Network (Central European Exchange Programme for University Studies), the NISPAcee - Network of Institutes and Schools of Public Administration in Central and Eastern Europe, the EDAMBA (European Doctoral programs Association in Management & Business Administration), the PILA (Publishers International Linking Association, Inc.) and the EASE (The European Association of Science Editors).

Faculty of Tourism and Hospitality Management, University of Rijeka was established in 1960 and during the course of time it has undergone various stages and organizational forms. Since 1974 it has been a constituent of the University of Rijeka. The Faculty is situated in Opatija, one of the leading tourist destinations in Croatia. Faculty of Tourism and Hospitality Management contributes largely to the tourism sector in Croatia in the area of science and education of human resources. The goal of the teaching staff of the Faculty is to support the development of the Croatian model of tourism through their pedagogical and scientific engagement. Nowadays, the Faculty is actively engaged in numerous research projects at home and abroad and also in the organization of scientific and professional conferences and meetings.

Strategic orientation of the Faculty of Tourism and Hospitality Management is to strengthen its position as a highly respected institution of higher education for tourism, hospitality and sustainable development in the Republic of Croatia and to disseminate knowledge throughout the wider regional area. Accordingly, special emphasis is on the quality improvement of the teaching process and scientific research. We collaborate for scientific and educational purposes with universities and departments around the world.

Hosting students under the Erasmus+ programme is one of our strategic goals, in which we see a great opportunity for collaboration with other faculties and progress. The Faculty of Civil Engineering is a socially responsible and open faculty - open to incoming students, teaching staff, researchers, but also to modern trends in higher education. In our system, students are at the centre of the educational process, and the system of teaching and learning is continuously monitored for quality. The Faculty of Medicine in Rijeka was founded in 1955. It was the first faculty established outside Zagreb and is the eldest constituent of the University of Rijeka.

The Faculty's activities began with teaching in the final years of medical studies. After having gained complete independence from the University of Zagreb's Faculty of Medicine in 1957, teaching activities developed rapidly, with an increasing number of academic staff members holding teaching and research positions. In 1961, a postgraduate study was established at the Faculty along with the study of Medicine and numerous other university and vocational study programs have since been introduced.

Research activities began to develop soon after the Faculty was founded. The first doctoral dissertation was defended at the Faculty as early as 1959. The rapid development of fundamental medical sciences contributed significantly to the research and professional development of clinical medical sciences.

By the end of the 1970s, the Faculty introduced a vocational study of Nursing, followed by other studies. All study programs were renewed in accordance with the Bologna process in 2005, and the ECTS evaluation system was adopted. A university study of Organization, Planning and Management in Health Care was designed on the principles of the Bologna declaration, and finally a vocational study of Midwifery was established. Since 2014, the study programmes Nursing, Midwifery, Physiotherapy, etc. have been conducted at the newly established Faculty of Health Studies in Rijeka. In 2017, the Faculty of Medicine started conducting the study programme of Medicine in English, and since 2021, the Faculty also offers the study programmes Pharmacy and Medical Laboratory Diagnostics.



The Faculty of Medicine in Rijeka is the most influential research institution in the Republic of Croatia outside Zagreb and the most widely recognized research institution of the University of Rijeka.

Several internationally prominent research teams at the Faculty are recognized as leaders in their respective fields. A major contribution to research development and recognition was provided by the employment or re-employment of several acclaimed scientists from abroad who formed their groups and

continued their successful work. The Faculty of Medicine has invested significantly in the education of research and academic staff, as well as in modern equipment and the establishment of new laboratories and centres.

The Faculty of Medicine has organized numerous scientific congresses and symposia, some of which were at the highest international level. Many Croatian and international awards as well as the highest state science awards of the Republic of Croatia were granted to researchers of the Faculty of Medicine in Rijeka.

6.7 Faculty of Maritime Studies

Educational activities at the Faculty of Maritime Studies date back to 1866 when, in the building of the former hospital, the Austrian-Hungarian Naval Academy opened its doors. Since 1889, the Academy had acted as the Imperial and Royal Naval Academy (Marine Academy). The Academy was open until 1914, when educational work was abandoned, and the Academy was turned into a field hospital.

Disruption in higher education in the field of maritime affairs lasted until 1949, when on 4 April 1949 the Maritime College in Rijeka was established by a Yugoslav government decree and later became a faculty and has continued its work to the present day.

In the academic year of 2005/2006, Faculty of Maritime Studies began with the implementation of the Bologna process by accepting the system of education that is based on three cycles: undergraduate, graduate and postgraduate studies. The curricula contain the necessary knowledge in the field of nautical studies, marine engineering, transportation technology, economics, law and management in shipping. Application of this knowledge allows recruitment and successful work in the profession, as well as in different maritime and transport agencies and companies whose activities are closely associated with shipping (shipping, sea ports, port authorities, the ministries responsible for maritime industry, cargo ships/freighters, agencies, the customs, transport companies, etc.).

The faculty continuously updates and improves the education of seafarers (deck and engine officers) for shipping companies, European and world market, experts for navigation and maritime technology, experts for marine engineering and maritime transport, experts for technology and organization of traffic, experts for logistics and management in maritime transport, experts for intermodal / multimodal transport, experts for electronic and computer technologies in maritime affairs.

The faculty develops and promotes the principles of safe and efficient navigation, the culture of safety at sea and protection of maritime environment. It also develops and updates postgraduate national and international Ph.D. studies concerning maritime affairs that are based on the latest scientific developments. Faculty of Maritime Studies is a Croatian reference centre of excellence in sustainable use of satellite navigational systems at the national level and directs its scientific research and expert activities towards accomplishing the goal of sustainable application of satellite navigation, which serves as a very important base of the national infrastructure.

Faculty of Law is a constituent of the University of Rijeka. The Study of Law was started in 1973, first as a part of the University of Rijeka, Faculty of Economics. In 1976, the University of Rijeka, Faculty of Law was established as an independent higher education institution, where the Study of Law continued to be carried out. From 1991 it is working under its present name – the University of Rijeka, Faculty of Law. The Faculty operates in its own building, which was finished in 1980.

The Faculty offers seven study programmes:

- 1) integrated undergraduate/graduate university Study of Law, upon completion of which students are awarded the academic title Master of Laws (univ. mag. iur.);
- 2) Postgraduate Specialist Study in Law of European Integrations, upon completion of which students are awarded the academic title of University Specialist in Law of European Integrations (spec. iur.);
- 3) Postgraduate Specialist Study in Corporate Finance Law, upon completion of which students are awarded the academic title of University Specialist in Corporate Finance Law (spec. iur.);
- 4) Postgraduate Specialist Study in Criminal Investigation, upon completion of which students are awarded the academic title of University Specialist in Criminal Investigation (spec. crim.);
- 5) the Postgraduate Doctoral Study Programme in the field of Social Sciences, the subject of Law, upon completion of which students are awarded the academic title of Doctor of Science in the field of Social Sciences, the subject of Law (dr. sc. socio.);
- 6) Undergraduate Professional Study Programme in Administration, upon completion of which students are awarded the professional title of Professional Bachelor of Public Administration (bacc. admin. publ.).;
- 7) the Specialist Graduate Professional Study Programme in Public Administration, upon completion of which students are awarded the professional title of Professional Specialist in Public Administration (mag. admin. publ.).

The Faculty was founded in 1960. At the beginning, only education in Mechanical Engineering was offered, but since 1969/1970 graduate engineers of Naval Architecture were also educated. The Faculty was renamed into the Mechanical-Naval Architecture Faculty and, in 1973, into the Faculty of Engineering. The opening of the study of Civil Engineering in 1971/72 at the Faculty brought about the establishment of the independent Faculty of Civil Engineering in 1976.

In 1965, the Faculty organised courses for higher vocational qualification, while in 1987 the vocational study of Electrical Engineering began. In the academic year of 1971/1972, the postgraduate study in the field of Mechanical Engineering and Naval Architecture were introduced respectively.

In the past decade, the Faculty has intensively taken actions on developing new study programmes which resulted in the beginning of the graduate university study in Electrical Engineering in the academic year of 1999/2000, the undergraduate university study in Computer Engineering in the academic year of 2008/2009, and the graduate university study in Computer Engineering in the academic year of 2011/2012. In the academic year of 2024/2025 new undergraduate study programme Mechatronics and Robotics will be launched.

Currently, the Faculty offers vocational and university studies in Naval Architecture, Electrical Engineering, Computer Engineering, and Mechanical Engineering, as well as postgraduate doctoral studies in the fields of Mechanical Engineering, Naval Architecture, Fundamental Engineering Sciences, Interdisciplinary Engineering Sciences and Electrical Engineering.

6.10 Faculty of Teacher Education

Education of teachers of lower grades of primary school began in Rijeka as early as 1960 as part of the Teacher Training College. At the first stage, from 1960 to 1963, the undergraduate early primary education study combined with another subject of instruction (Croatian, Mathematics, Geography and History) and was conducted at the institution, the purpose of which was to educate teachers for primary schools. The College had the status of a collegiate school and the study lasted for two years. The named study, also in duration of two years, continued to be conducted between 1978 and 1992, when the Teacher Training University College was established.

In 1992 the study was structured as a four years university study, upon whose completion students acquire university qualifications and the title of Graduate Early Primary School teacher. The university study was conducted at the Teacher Training University College, namely subsequently established Faculty of Humanities and Social Studies in Rijeka until 1998, when the Faculty of Teacher Education was established in Rijeka.

The basic activity of the Faculty was structuring and conducting the vocational undergraduate four years study educating teachers for lower grades of primary schools as well as the vocational study for preschool teachers and assistants in kindergartens. The undergraduate teacher study was conducted at first as a study with a major subject (Physical Education, Music and Art) and starting with the academic year 2001/2002 as the so called "pure" vocational study of early primary school education. This study has been, after adapting to the requirements of the Bologna process, conducted under the name of Vocational Early Primary Education Study.



Based on the resolution signed by the Minister of Science, Education and Sports on 22 September 2006, Faculty of Teacher Education in Rijeka was registered in the Register of Higher Education Institutions of the Ministry of Science, Education and Sports.

6.11 Faculty of Health Studies

Faculty of Health Studies is the

youngest faculty of the University Rijeka and it was detached from the Faculty of Medicine in 2014. Faculty of Medicine in Rijeka was founded in 1955, but Rijeka got its first hospital and schooled physicians as early as 1440s, and the City Statute in 1530. Faculty of Medicine was the first medicine faculty in Croatia established outside Zagreb and it is the eldest member institution of the University of Rijeka. By the end of the 1970s, the Faculty of Medicine introduced a vocational study in Nursing, followed by other vocational studies: Physiotherapy, Medical Laboratory Diagnostics, Radiologic Technology, and at the end Midwifery. All these study programs were renewed in accordance with the Bologna process in 2005, and the ECTS evaluation system was adopted. Later, a number of university study programs have been also introduced on Faculty of Medicine. All these vocational studies as well as some university studies were relocated to new Faculty of Health Studies.

The building hosting Faculty of Health Studies was constructed in the 1940s and was supposed to offer poor people warm meal and shelter, but at the end of 2013 it was renewed and hosted Faculty of Health Studies.

It is interesting to mention some historical facts as that the first public midwifery school in Croatia was founded in Rijeka in 1786, by Giacomo Cosmini and Giovanni Carrobi. In February 1896, only a month after Röntgen's discovery, the first X-ray scan in Croatia was obtained by the physicist Peter Salcher, a professor at Rijeka Navy Academy and a collaborator of Ernst Mach at ultra-fast photography research.

Salcher was the first in the world to photograph a gun bullet in flight. Also, the vacuum extractor for babies was invented in Rijeka in 1952, by Viktor Finderle (1902–1964).

The aim of the formation of the Faculty of Health Studies and the main mission of the Faculty is to provide excellence in education of students in the fields of health care.

The main Faculty's activity is teaching, but also developing scientific research activities and scientific projects, as well as new study programs, including interdisciplinary studies. International cooperation of the Faculty of Health Studies is also very important segment and we develop it through various forms of cooperation with international universities and institutions.

The Faculty of Dental Medicine was founded on 23 July 2019 by decision of the University of Rijeka. The Faculty consists of six departments: Department of Oral Surgery, Department of Paediatric Dentistry, Department of Endodontics and Restorative Dental Medicine, Department of Oral Medicine, Department of Periodontology, Department of Orthodontics and the Department of Prosthodontics.

The primary role of our Dental Faculty is the training of dental students to become qualified dentists with key skills and clinical competencies. The oral care provided by our dental students is overseen by highly experienced dentists, dental specialists and university professors. In this way, our patients receive high-quality treatment while our students gain essential experience in an ideal learning environment.

The clinical part takes place at the Clinical Hospital Centre Rijeka – a complex of 33 clinics and clinical departments with 1069 beds and a staff of 3252 doctors and nurses, complemented by Health Centre Rijeka, state and private institutions.

Our dentistry program attracts international students from all over the world including Germany, Italy, France. Our small intake means that you will work closely with our academic staff, you will be taught in small groups and you will get a sense of belonging to a powerful team of classmates and practitioners offering you continuous support for personal and academic development.

Faculty of Informatics and Digital Technologies (formerly known as the Department of Informatics) at the University of Rijeka resulted from a long-term development of educational and scientific activities in the field of informatics which date back to the year 1986 when the Institute of Informatics was founded at the Faculty of Arts and Sciences (later renamed as the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences) in Rijeka.

The Faculty of Informatics and Digital Technologies was founded in April 2008 as Department of Informatics with the mission of creating conditions necessary for scientific research in the area of social sciences, in the field of information and communication sciences, and in the area of technical sciences, in



field of computing. Members of the Faculty work on educational and scientific activities in the domain of information systems, intelligent systems, networking, communication systems, including the development of multimedia systems learning support systems (elearning systems).

The aim of the Faculty is to be profiled as an internationally recognised scientific institution that fosters and encourages highest academic values in research and education in the field of information and communication sciences and computing, in order to develop the economy and improve society as a whole.

The Faculty of Informatics and Digital Technologies has seven chairs and five laboratories, which are organised to support educational and scientific activities: The Chair of Software Development, the Chair of Intelligent Systems, the Chair of Communication and Computing Systems, the Chair of Multimedia Systems and E-learning, the Chair of Information Systems, the Chair of Business Informatics, and the Chair

of Applied Mathematics and General Subjects. The five laboratories include the following: Laboratory for Pattern Recognition and Soft Computing, Laboratory for Sematic Technologies, Laboratory for Application of Information Technologies in Education, and Laboratory for Development of Information Systems.

6.14 Faculty of Mathematics

As a successor to various institutions that have been educating teachers of mathematics since the 1960's, the Faculty of Mathematics was established in April 2008, fist named as Department of Mathematics, based on the Decision which was passed by University of Rijeka's Senate in December 2007. By another decision of the Senate in September 2021, Department of Mathematics became the Faculty of Mathematics. Most of the mathematicians from the University of Rijeka are either employed by, or in some way associated with the Faculty of Mathematics.

The studies which are organised and conducted by the Faculty of Mathematics, University of Rijeka, are: the first cycle study programme in mathematics and the second cycle study programme in mathematics and computer sciences.

The Faculty is divided into divisions: Division of Algebra and Number Theory, Division of Discrete Mathematics and Division of Mathematical Analysis. Since 2011, the Faculty has been organising and conducting the first graduate study programme of mathematics unrelated to teacher education at the University of Rijeka: Discrete Mathematics and its Applications. This study programme differs in its content and learning outcomes from other existing study programmes of mathematics in the Republic of Croatia (that are not aimed at education of future teachers).

Some of the most notable projects of the Faculty of Mathematics so far were the organization of NATO Advanced Study Institute on Information Security and Related Combinatorics in 2010 and 5th Croatian Mathematical Congress in 2012.

6.15 Faculty of Physics

The Department of Physics of the University of Rijeka was established at the end of 2007 as a successor to schools involved in the education of high-school teachers since the 1960's.

The Vocational College of Education was established in 1953 with the aim of providing education for teachers of mathematics and physics in vocational-technical and economic schools. The Department of mathematics and applied physics was established in the academic year of 1960/61. In 1962, the Vocational College of Education changed its name to School of Industrial Education which was transformed (in 1972) into the Faculty of Industrial Education with university courses in mathematics and physics. The Faculty of Education in Rijeka was established in 1977, including the Department of mathematics and physics as a part of it. In 1998, the Faculty was registered under the name Faculty of Philosophy (Faculty of Arts and Sciences) with the Physics Department as one of the founding members.

More ambitious development of the University of Rijeka in the recent years has led to the establishment of an independent Department of Physics as a modern university department with the mission of organizing physics teaching at all Faculties and Departments of the University and performing internationally recognized scientific research. In this process, several respected scientists from foreign and domestic institutions have joined the Department. In this way, the Department has not only increased in the number of permanent staff, but also in the diversity of the research subjects, covering areas from atomic and molecular physics, nuclear physics or condensed matter physics, to particle physics, astrophysics, educational physics or the most fundamental research in unification of forces and superstring theory.

With the opening of the new building on the University Campus on Trsat the Department of Physics acquired adequate space that substantially improved the teaching, research and student standard. Also, the new laboratories, established jointly with Centre for micro nano-sciences and technologies, have been equipped with the state-of-the-art scientific equipment, while the existing ones were substantially modernized with financial support from the European Regional Development Fund and specifically by the University of Rijeka project "Development of the research infrastructure on the Trsat Campus". The students now have the opportunity to work on modern equipment equal to one found in the most advanced European laboratories. As a result of its development, the Department of Physics was renamed recently and became Faculty of Physics. It offers several programs in physics and two interdisciplinary studies.

The Department of Biotechnology was founded in July 2008 by the Senate of the University of Rijeka as a research and teaching unit. It comprises of two divisions: Molecular and System Biomedicine Division and Medicinal Chemistry Division. Main research activities at the Department are performed in both fundamental and applied research areas of molecular medicine, medicinal chemistry, and high-throughput personalized medicine by use of state-of-the-art technology and equipment. The Department holds a number of co-operations with international research companies involved in drug research and development or new medical diagnostic procedures. In November 2023 Department changed its name to Faculty of Biotechnology and Drug Development.

The Speech and Language Pathology study programme was founded in 2020. In 2020/21, the first generation of students was enrolled in the first year. The enrollment quota is 30 students per year. Study programme is aimed at acquiring a wide range of knowledge and skills that provide students with an understanding of various phenomena that can lead to impaired communication skills, as well as language, speech, voice and swallowing abilities.

The study program enables the acquisition of competencies for prevention, diagnostics, therapy and counseling in the field of human communication and swallowing disorders. Interdisciplinarity of the study programme contributes to the personal development of the student, and due to acquired knowledge enables them to feel as a useful member of society who helps vulnerable groups and groups at risk of social exclusion. This interdisciplinarity gives students the opportunity for further training in various scientific fields and sectors of work (health care system, education, social welfare system, private practice etc.).

Teaching and clinical unit and an integral part of the Speech and Language Pathology study programme is Speech and language pathology centre (UniLOG). Its mission is providing speech and language therapy services to the local community, professional practice for students, organization of lifelong learning programs for speech and language therapists and other professionals as well as multidisciplinary research.

After completing the undergraduate university study programme, it is possible to continue education in the graduate study programme of Speech and Language Pathology at the University of Rijeka, which is in preparation.
