The University of Rijeka, Centre for Advanced Studies of Southeast Europe, and the Danish Embassy in Croatia are pleased to announce a conference envisioned to encourage greater involvement from academia, industry, and civil society in tackling maritime security in the Mediterranean and NATO's southern neighborhood.

The conference will initiate discussions on establishing an academic network for Mediterranean maritime security, bringing together researchers and academics from NATO and partner countries. By examining the concepts presented in *Understanding Maritime Security* by Christian Bueger and Timothy Edmunds (OUP, 2024), participants will be prepared to assess the role of both digital and physical infrastructure connectivity in enhancing the Mediterranean's maritime security architecture.

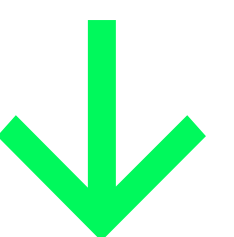
Over 80% of global trade goes through maritime routes, and up to 99% of worldwide data flow is transmitted via undersea cables. The Mediterranean Sea is a crucial crossroads for trade, energy supply, cultural exchange, and geopolitical interactions. However, it also confronts increasing challenges related to maritime security, sustainability, and regional cooperation. Connectivity in the Mediterranean is a double-edged sword; it fosters economic growth and regional interdependence while exposing vulnerabilities in infrastructure, governance, and security systems.

The increasing maritime presence of strategic competitors and adversaries near NATO further strains the connections between NATO's eastern and southern flanks. This is particularly evident in Rijeka, the host city of the conference and home to the largest port in Croatia, which was designated a port of special (international) economic interest in 1996. Following Croatia's accession to the EU, it became part of the EU's core transport network, TEN-T, and a vital segment of the Mediterranean corridor.

As of April 2024, the port of Rijeka has been included in two additional corridors: the Baltic Sea–Adriatic Sea corridor and the Western Balkans–Eastern Mediterranean corridor. This development focuses on long-standing issues, including irregular migration, smuggling, piracy, organized crime, ark fleets, threats to critical maritime infrastructure, cybersecurity risks, environmental degradation, and political tensions. Ark fleets, threats to critical maritime infrastructure, cybersecurity risks, environmental concerns in the Red Sea, external risks to Allied security in the eastern Mediterranean, geopolitical tensions with maritime implications, and the protection of undersea infrastructure remain significant challenges. These issues frequently overlap and compromise the region's stability and prosperity, making collaborative solutions essential.
